

# SHOW SCHEDULE 2019

## SECTION A - CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

ALL ENTRIES IN SECTION A SHOULD BE CHILDREN'S UNAIDED WORK

Please put your AGE but not your name on the FRONT of your entry to assist with judging

(Edible items in Section A will be judged on appearance and not tasted)

### 5-year-olds and under

- Class 1 A space monster using a cardboard box or tube
- Class 2 A fruit and/or vegetable print picture
- Class 3 I made it myself
- Class 4 I grew it myself
- Class 5 A photograph taken by myself

### 6 to 11 years

- Class 6 Make a rocket (any materials) no bigger than 50cms in any direction
- Class 7 Make a stained glass window
- Class 8 I baked it myself
- Class 9 I made it myself
- Class 10 I grew it myself
- Class 11 A photograph taken by myself

### 12 and over, up to 16

- Class 12 Design and make a poster to promote reducing plastic waste (may include computer art)
- Class 13 Make an astronaut (any materials including Lego, K'Nex, etc)
- Class 14 I made it myself
- Class 15 I grew it myself
- Class 16 A photograph taken by myself

Children may enter their own unaided work in any adult class if they wish.

## SECTION B - THE SCARECROW COMPETITION

- Class 17 **A scarecrow based on a film or book character**  
Entries welcome from families, groups and businesses.

ENTRIES CLOSE AT 8pm ON WEDNESDAY 7th AUGUST.  
ON THE DAY, SCARECROWS TO BE REGISTERED BETWEEN 8.30 AND 11am AT THE SHOW MARQUEE OR INFORMATION POINT.  
ENTRY FEE £1, WHICH WILL BE USED AS PRIZES.

All scarecrows will be displayed outside the show marquee. The competition will be judged by public vote. Visitors will purchase a 10p token and place it in the appropriate tub - only ONE vote per person. Voting closes at 3pm.

## SECTION C - FLORAL ART

- Class 18 An arrangement on using a napkin ring (max 15cm in any direction)
- Class 19 A Continental-style arrangement in a window tough (max 60cm in any direction)
- Class 20 'St Denys Church' - an arrangement involving a candlestick
- Class 21 An arrangement in a hydrangea head
- Class 22 An exhibit using flowers and foliage from your garden
- Class 23 **Novice:** your first flower arrangement

## SECTION D - CUT FLOWERS

- Class 24 One vase of 5 stems of sweet peas
- Class 25 One vase of any 5 stems of any cut flowers from your garden -not sweet peas
- Class 26 One specimen rose bloom
- Class 27 Trio of hosta leaves (all the same)
- Class 28 One vase of 3 blooms of dahlias (all of the same group)
- Class 29 **Novice:** One vase of any 3 stems of any flowers from your garden

Classes 24-29 to be displayed in the vases provided.

## SECTION E - POT PLANTS

- Class 30 A potted fuchsia  
Class 31 A potted pelargonium (flower or foliage)  
Class 32 A potted house plant  
Class 33 A cactus or succulent  
Class 34 A pot of marigolds grown from seed in 2019

**All of the above should be in a pot of maximum 2 litre e.g. 17cm top diameter; 13cm height; 12 cm bottom diameter.**

## SECTION F - FRUIT

- Class 35 3 strings of any currants, same or mixed  
Class 36 A plate of 10 berries (same cultivar)  
Class 37 3 sticks of rhubarb (75mm of the leaf remaining)  
Class 38 3 items (the same or mixed) of any other fruits not in the schedule  
Class 39 **Novice** : any 3 fruits

**Please note that all fruit must be staged with stalks attached.**

## SECTION G - VEGETABLES

- Class 40 3 onions, over 250g each, as grown (not dressed)  
Class 41 A pair of cucumbers  
Class 42 One dish of 3 potatoes of one cultivar  
Class 43 5 carrots, all the same but any type, tops trimmed to approx. 8cm  
Class 44 3 beetroot with leaves trimmed to approx. 8cm  
Class 45 One bunch of 8 radishes (with 4cm of leaf remaining)  
Class 46 3 beans (Runner or French)  
Class 47 3 broad beans  
Class 48 3 courgettes 10-20 cm long  
Class 49 A truss of cherry tomatoes with the majority ripe  
Class 50 3 tomatoes  
Class 51 3 peppers - hot (chilli) or sweet  
Class 52 The heaviest marrow  
Class 53 The longest runner bean  
Class 54 Any other vegetable (please provide a label of the cultivar)  
Class 55 A collection of mixed vegetables displayed on a seed tray and labelled  
Class 56 **Novice**: show us what you have grown  
Class 57 A builder's bucket (approx. 10 litres) of home-made, organic compost

**Unless otherwise stated each class (40-56), must consist of the same cultivar. Clean root vegetables with a cloth to remove soil. Retain stalk and bloom on other vegetables wherever possible.**

## SECTION H - BAKERY

- Class 58 Make a loaf (brown or white) by hand or machine in a 2lb (900g) tin  
Class 59 A vegan cake (no eggs or dairy)  
Class 60 3 potato scones or farls  
Class 61 3 scones: fruit, savoury or plain  
Class 62 3 Viennese fingers  
Class 63 Afternoon Tea - a bite-size display on a cake stand  
Class 64 A Victoria sponge cake

tin approx. 18-20 cm (7-8 inches) using the following recipe:

The weight of 3 eggs in self-	3 eggs
raising flour, butter and caster	1 teaspoon vanilla essence
sugar	2-3 tablespoons raspberry jam

Baked in 2 tins, Gas Mark 4 / 180°C / 350°F

Cake to be dusted with caster sugar.

- Class 65 A 3D sugarcraft model of a creature/figure/structure - judged on decoration only  
Class 66 A spray of wired sugar flowers  
Class 67 A cake to commemorate the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St Denys' Church judged on decoration only  
Class 68 **Novice**: Soda bread  
Class 69 **Novice**: 3 pieces of fantail shortbread

**Plate and cover with cling film. Bread should be 1 day old. All items will be cut and tasted except classes 65-67. Items in classes 65-67 should be made in the last 12 months.**

## SECTION J - PRESERVES/ WINE

Class 70	Jar of any fruit jam
Class 71	Jar of any fruit jell
Class 72	Jar of any citrus fruit marmalade
Class 73	Jar of any citrus curd
Class 74	Jar of chutney or pickle
Class 75	Jar of pickled onions or other vegetables
Class 76	Bottle of wine
Class 77	Best brewed beverage (alcoholic or non-alcoholic)

**Plain jars and lids should be used, i.e. no jars or lids bearing trademarks.**

Minimum weight of preserves is 350g (12oz). Jars to be filled to within 3mm (<sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub> inch). Lids should be either wax discs and cellophane dust cover or new screw-top lid. Chutneys and pickles should be made at least **2** months before the show. Citrus curds must be under **3** weeks old and must have a wax disc and cellophane dust cover (not metal lid). Labels should have a full date showing day, month and year of production and be centred between the seams of the jar.

Wine should be presented in clear glass bottles with a white plastic topped flanged cork, which need not be sealed. Bottles should be filled to within 12mm (<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inch) of base of cork. Labels should state type of wine, year of making and indicate sweetness. No sediment in bottle. Wines must be made by the exhibitor and not fortified. Labels to be fixed 25mm (1 inch) from the bottom and centred between the bottle seams.

**Entries can be in any medium, but must not exceed 600mm by 800mm including frame. Artwork needs to have suitable fixings for hanging. Outsize artwork will not be judged.**

Entries must not exceed A4 size including mount; must be mounted on card with **Velcro hook fixings** and no frames. **Outsize photos will not be judged.**

Class 98	An item of hand embroidery or tapestry
Class 99	A card (not from a kit nor classes 95 -98)
Class 100	An item of paper sculpture or origami (including quilling)
Class 101	An item of jewellery or beadwork
Class 102	An item of wood or metal work
Class 103	A knitted item
Class 104	A crocheted item
Class 105	Twice-loved - an item re-using old materials
Class 106	A toy for a child (any media)
Class 107	Something I've made (no larger than 1m x 1m x 1m)
Class 108	<b>Novice:</b> A bag or purse (any materials)
Class 109	<b>Novice:</b> Show us what you can make

**Multiple entries by any one person are accepted at the discretion of the Show Clerk to avoid duplication of type across Section M.**

All items must be made during the last **12** months, **please put measurements for ALL entries on the entry form to assist us with staging.** If larger than 1 metre, please contact the show clerk beforehand.

## THE NOVICE CHALLENGE CUP

The Novice Challenge cup will be awarded to the entrant who gains the most points in the adult Novice Classes.

All novice classes are open to any exhibitors who have not previously won 1st prize in any class in the Section entered.

### BEST IN SHOW SHIELD

This year the Best in Show shield will be for the best exhibit across the show. The individual judges will choose the best exhibit in their area of expertise by marking it with a gold sticker. Judges will be asked to select the Best Exhibit in the Show from these at 12.55pm - just before the marquee opens to the public.

### HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS

- 1. Do allow plenty of time to stage your exhibits.** Avoid that last-minute rush by completing labels or mounting at home.
- 2. Check carefully** that you have the correct number of items, as required by the Schedule.
- 3. Always** take more exhibits to the Show than you will need, then choose the best just before you stage your entry.
- 4. Remember condition and uniformity.** Every exhibit should be in its most perfect phase and uniform in shape, size and condition.
- 5. Remember your entries remain on display from before judging until 5pm.** Please show your raffle ticket for collection.

### THE JUDGES

The judges used for the Show competition are Horticultural Guild, WI Guild or academically qualified judges with no connection to any Fete and Show committee member. Their decisions are completely impartial and all entries are anonymous at the time of judging.

You will be given an exhibit card for each of the classes you have entered. Please place these cards next to your entries in the marquee. There will be stewards available to assist you, if needed.

**The marquee will be closed to exhibitors at 10.15am.**

### POINTS SYSTEM

Points will be awarded in each class as follows:

**1st Prize - 3 points      2nd prize - 2 points      3rd prize - 1 point**

Points will be added together in each section (e.g. Bakery) to find the Section Winners. They will be awarded a certificate, prize and/or cup.

There will also be a winner for the Novice Challenge Cup and the Best in Show. (See page 7 for details).

**PRIZE WINNERS** - Will all section winners and overall winners please try to collect their certificate, prize or cup at the ceremony on the Village Green at 4.30pm. Any remaining prizes will be delivered to winners as soon as possible after the Show.
